Variously known through the last thirty-five years as the William Ribble House, or before that, the Dr. Julian Lentz House, this house was built in 1915 and, like many College Hill homes, is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. The best description of it would be a “Craftsman Four-Square.” Note the roof brackets and the Bungalow-type porch supports. Inside, the home has been bringing back Arts-and-Crafts details in the front parlor to echo the coffered ceiling, including settles designed by Gustav Stickley (the purveyor of Arts and Crafts style in the US at the turn of the century), an antique sideboard and period lighting. The home has white oak floors downstairs and red oak moldings, and a beautiful staircase. The kitchen and upstairs bath have been remodeled, both designed by Maryville architect Jeff Fletcher.
