

## 209 Goddard Avenue



Mrs. John Walker, whose homestead was located on Maryville College Campus and later, became The Morningside Inn, built this Colonial Revival influenced home in 1934. This home is one of the several “Walker Homes” built during the Great Depression for occupancy by Maryville College professors. They have similar traits as Morningside Inn such as grand staircases and special wood moldings. Other traits of a “Walker Home” are small kitchens, screened in porches and latticework. These homes provided housing for the professors as required and then reverted to the college’s ownership.

Dean McClellan, former Dean of Men at Maryville College, and his family occupied the house for some ten years in the 1930’s and 1940’s. Frances and Billie Patterson lived in the house for five years then purchased the house and stayed another 25 years.

This is a two-story frame home, 3 bays, and rectangular plan Colonial Revival influenced residence. The main façade is a one-story porch with square columns, which enclose the entrance bay. Also on the first story are paired multi-light French doors in the east and west bays.
