

Maryville College Bicentennial Celebration Plans are Underway






Fall is for planting

I have folks ask me often when is the best time to plant trees and shrubs. Here in eastern Tennessee since the ground doesn't typically freeze, the furthest amount of time before the hottest months is the best time to plant. We are also fortunate to be able to

plant year around, but fall is the best. The more time the plant has to get established the better it will do. There are two primary reasons fall is the best time. First, we typically start getting more rain. Second,




with the ground not freezing the roots of the plants will continue to grow throughout winter even though the plant is dormant. The more roots you



can get to grow the better established and less sensitive the plant will be to potential drought

and heat during summer. For a little added boost make sure you use a fertilizer that promotes root growth only as well as make sure you plant in the right place. Be sure to google search the plant to find out it's mature size and place it





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taking these extra steps vou can save a lot of time and labor from not having to trim and prune as much and also getting the plant off to a great start.
