The Board recently fielded questions about the cemetery and the recent removal of trees. As the cemetery is adjacent to the district, many believe it is part of the neighborhood; however, while the cemetery is linked to the neighborhood through history (look at many of the gravesite names and you will see famil-

iar ones like Cates, Goddard and Stanley), it is not actually owned by the neighborhood or the city; it is owned by a private trust. The Board, nor any HCHNA resident, have a voice in what happens in the cemetery. The trees taken down, many of which were maple, were diseased and there was concern that they could fall and hurt someone walking. Although the trees were big and beautiful, it is important to note that trees

have a life cycle and many of the trees throughout the neighborhood, are over 100 years old and reaching the end of their lives.

While it can be difficult to see a beautiful tree cut down, it is important to remember that just because a tree looks healthy, does not mean that it is. A number of factors can shorten the life cycle of a tree (i.e., soil type and compaction, availability of nutrients,

competition and pests) and all of these factors need to be taken into consideration prior to the removal of any tree.



## FRIENDLY NEIGHBORHOOD REMINDERS

Just a couple of friendly reminders regarding neighborhood activities:

- As per the Historic Zoning Regulations, on-site, longterm (over two weeks) parking of campers, boats, jet skis, motor homes, travel trailers, all terrain vehicles (ATV's),
- general use trailers and other similar portable equipment] shall be parked to the rear of lots so they are not readily visible from the street.
- Garbage cans should be removed from the street following pick up and brought back to the house until the next pick up date.
- ed are to be discarded are to be placed at the curb *no earlier than* three days prior to bulk pick up. Bulk pick up of these items is scheduled for the week of the 15th of every month.
- Please remember that the speed limit in the neighborhood is 25 MPH.
